# High school football

A year after seeing its title run end, Clinton-Massie raced through the American Division with a 5-0 record, holding off Wilmington and its 4-1 league mark.

The two Clinton County entrants were the only winning league marks in the six-team grouping. It was a down year for Western Brown, New Richmond, Goshen and Batavia.

Western Brown won the championship in 2022 but it's been Massie's to relinquish in recent years.

In the National Division, Blanchester went 4-1 but was part of a three-way title run with Williamsburg and Bethel-Tate. That trio of schools has won every National Division crown since Batavia in 2014.

East Clinton was next in line but the Astros were joined by Clermont Northeast-

ern and football-only Fayetteville-Perry with a sub-.500 mark.

Awards last year went to Dan McSurley of Clinton-Massie as coach of the year and Logan Chesser of CM as the offensive player of the year. Chesser had put together one of the great running back seasons in Falcons football history before being hit with an knee injury.

Chesser played eight games and had 1,198 yards and 17 touchdowns on the ground, that a season after 1,353 yards and 12 scores on the ground in 2022.

Wilmington's Mikey Brown Jr. was the defensive player of the year after recording 101 tackles (4 for loss), three interceptions and a fumble recovery.

On the National side, Jeff Essig of Bethel-Tate was coach of the year, JJ Miller of Williamsburg offensive player of the year and Nolan Darnell of Bethel-Tate defensive player of the year.

## BLANCHESTER

There are 13 returning starters for the Blanchester High School football team this fall as Justin Schmitz enters his second season as head coach.

Schmitz will be assisted by Austin Knight, Brandon Scott, Dan Scott, Tomas Oldham and Jed Turpin. All six varsity coaches are Blanchester High School graduates.

The BHS offense will look decidedly different in 2024 without do-it-all quarterback Bryce Sipple at the helm. He passed for 1,214 yards and

21 touchdowns while running for 1,231 yards and 12 more scores in 2023. Sipple was third team All-Ohio in 2023.

All-league players who graduated in the spring were first-teamers Chase Barnes, Jude Huston (SBAAC best 14 sacks), Sipple and Sebastian Smith, along with second-teamers Austin Dick, Seth Perkins, Schuyler Smith and honorable mention pick Xander Culberson. Also, Jarrod Daniels and Caleb Holley are not returning.

Smith, Huston and Barnes were the top three tacklers on the Wildcats defense.

The Wildcats lost a wild 40-34 shootout with Williamsburg last season, an outcome surrounded by three-game win streaks on each side. BHS beat Bethel-Tate 54-33 in the regular season then lost to the Tigers 35-20 in the playoffs.

Top returning players are Caleb Sears, Tristen Malone, Zach Musselman and Ayden Basham. Musselman and Malone were first team All-SBAAC last season. Newcomers of note are Alex Johnson, Sammy Roush, Cory Kidd, Blake Hillard, Jacob Allen, Brian Magdaleno-Herrera, Eli Holley, Brayden Behymer, Cooper Reynolds and Angel Garcia Torres.

## CLINTON-MASSIE

The Falcons were back in the state title hunt in 2023, losing in the third round to eventual state runnerup Archbishop Kettering Alter, 21-3

Massie had won 19 of its last 21 games since an almost unheard of four-game losing streak to start the 2022 season.

Dan McSurley enters the season with 269 wins at Clinton-Massie and 289 overall. He will be assisted by Scott Rolf, Jeskee Zantene, Doug Howard, Jordan Phipps, Barry Wulf, AJ Avery, Trey Uetrecht.

All-league players who graduated this spring were Elijah Groh, Brighton Rodman and Miles Theetge from the first team and second-teamer Ean McGuinness and honorable mention Tayten McCoy. Groh and Theetge were both named to the All-Ohio second team in 2023.

There are 23 returning letterwinners, McSurley said, among them first-team standouts Chesser, Ty Clutter, Nolan Phipps.

Massie ran for 4,114 yards in 13 games last season with 54 touchdowns on the ground.

McGuinness hit 7 field goals and 57 of 58 extra points to continue the Falcons strong kicking tradition.

Clutter (74) and Phipps (70) were the top tacklers last season. Clutter was a second team All-Ohio line-backer.

The Falcons dealt with several season-ending injuries last season but McSurley said the team is back and healthy. As the Falcons begin play back at Frank Irelan Field, they'll do so under a much-needed new turf playing surface, made possible through 100 percent private donations.

Peyton Warren is the top returning running back as Logan Chesser, second team All-Ohio in 2023 despite a knee injury, works his way back into playing shape, McSurley said. Chesser had 1,198 yards and 17 touchdowns while missing five games last season.

## EAST CLINTON

East Clinton faced a rugged slate in 2023, finishing 4-6. All six losses were to playoff teams.

The Astros will look to take that next step in 2024 and get over the hump by beating playoff teams, coach Steve Olds said.

Olds, nine years on the EC coaching staff, is in his sixth season as head coach. He will be assisted by Adam Boysel (special teams, JV

coach), Bryan Floyd (defensive coordinator), Nick Anderson (co-defensive coordinator, secondary), Trent Olds (offensive coordinator), Zach Bosier (running backs, linebackers), Adam Wilson (defensive line) at the high school level. Junior coaches are Jayson Edison (head coach) and Logan McPherson.

There are eight returning starters and nine returning letterwinners for EC, who finished 2-3 in the SBAAC National Division last season.

Leading the way is Dameon Williams, a two-time All-Southwest District honoree at running back and defensive back; Owen Roberts, offensive and defensive lineman; Aiden Conger, offensive back and linebacker; Clayton Kimmey, receiver and defensive back.

Barrett Beam (tight end/linebacker), Brody McCulley (running back/linebacker) and Carson Gilpen (offensive and defensive line) are the top newcomers to the EC football program, Olds said.

All-league players who graduated in the spring were first-teamers Denver Day, Glenn Peacock and second-teamer Maddix Crowe.

Peacock rushed for 1,150 yards and 11 TDs in 9 games last season

## WILMINGTON

The Hurricane begins its third season under head coach Ryan Evans Sr. WHS had one of its best seasons in recent memory last year with an 8-3 mark.

The Hurricane had wins over four playoff teams but lost in the post-season to Bellbrook 48-0.

The 8 wins is the most since the 2014 WHS squad went 8-2 and just the third time the Hurricane reached 8 wins since the 1963 team won 9 times.

Mikey Brown Jr., the SBAAC American Division Defensive Player of the Year and second team All-Ohio, is off to play football for Ohio Northern University.

Also graduating WHS were first-team players such as offensive lineman and Lombardi winner Chris Stewart (at Div. II University of Indianapolis), second-teamer Jon Custis, second-teamer Caydn Denniston and honorable mention pick Aiden Price.

Custis averaged 36.4 yards on 28 punts last season with 17 downed inside the 20. He was given honorable mention All-Ohio.

Denniston rushed for 1,060 yards and 8 scores while Price ran for 452 yards and 8 scores. Price, the WHS signal caller, passed for 1,932 yards and 15 TDs last year.

But returning are SBAAC first-team standouts Malachi Cumberland, Jesse Keith, Eli Stewart, Bryson Schutte and Zane Smith. Stewart gives the kickoff return some

juice. He averaged 27.7 yards and had a touchdown on 12 returns last season.

Cumberland is the most imposing figure on a staunch WHS defense. He was first team All-Ohio last season when he had 12 sacks and 29 tackles for loss.

Keith had 17 tackles for loss. Luke Achtermann had a superb sophomore season in 2022 but was slowed by injury in 2023. His best 2023 game was the playoff finale, a 10-tackle performance against Bellbrook.

Evans will be assisted by Michael Brown Sr. (offensive coordinator, wide receivers),

OJ Blair (defensive coordinator), Henry Dawkins Jr. (linebackers, special teams), Dave Allen (offensive line, JV head coach), Thomas Harlan (defensive line), Matthew Iacobucci (running backs), Marcus Stewart (cornerbacks), Zach Williams (quarterbacks) at the varsity level.

The middle school coach are head coach Travis Mellinger and assistants TJ Thompson, Michael Thompson and Issac Rollins.

There are 16 returning letterwinners for the Hurricane, with 13 of them returning starters.



# High school boys soccer

Wilmington won a tight battle for the SBAAC American Division top spot last season with a 7-1-2 record. Batavia was runnerup at 7-2-1.

Georgetown went 6-0-2 and won the National Division.

Neither Blanchester nor East Clinton have a boys soccer program at this time.

## CLINTON-MASSIE

Clinton-Massie finished 10-6-3 last season. Head coach Trevor Kackley enters his fourth season as head coach. He'll be assisted by Adam Brausch this season.

Weston Carpenter led Massie with 12 goals and 30 points but he graduated in the spring, as did Carter

Amstutz, AJ Brewer, Javen Carpenter, Carson Myers and Jake Ryan.

Weston Carpenter, Wyatt Coblentz and Gleb Luce were first team all-league in 2023.

In all, there are 13 returning letterwinners for the Falcon, seven of them starters in 2023.

Coblentz, Luce, Kennedy Morgan and Jack Thamann are the top returning players. Koltyn Hughes, Jace Horner and Yarik Luce are the top newcomers to the Massie program.

Kackley said Coblentz has shown quality leadership to help the team chemistry. Danny Mefford has taken the "underclassmen under

his wing and making the transition into (high school) soccer better." Noah Hawk has helped the team attitude and speed of play, along with helping the underclassmen develop, the coach said.

While the team must improve its communication on the field and individual confidence, Kackley said, the squad has a positive attitude and energy, along with a drive to be the best every time they touch the pitch.

## WILMINGTON

Imad El-Macharrafie, the reigning SBAAC American Division coach of the year, guided the Hurricane to an American Division championship in 2023, the team's first since 2020.

WHS improved from 5-9-4 in 2022 to 10-4-3 in 2023.

El-Macharrafie will be assisted this season by Bobby Oetzel and Robert Collins.

Jose Morales was an offensive force last season, garnering SBAAC American Division player of the year honors. He had 30 goals and 67 total points to lead the league.

Ben Angelica led the loop

with 13 assists and 12 goals in his inaugural season at WHS in 2023. Bryce Vilvens had 10 assists, third in the league.

But Morales and Levi Cochran (141 saves and six shutouts in goal for WHS) have graduated, along with Steven Collins, Minh Le, Dylan Littrel and Cristian Perez.

Morales, Angelica, Cochran, Collins, Aven Patel and Vilvens were first-team all-league last season.

There are 11 returning letterwinners and seven returning starters, so the cupboard is far from bare for the Hurricane. Zander Johnson joins Angelica, Patel and Vilvens as the top returning players.

"This is a dynamic battle-tested team that is hungry," said El-Macharrafie, who added the team will contend again in the SBAAC if it remains healthy.

"Our goal is realistic and what it always is ... to win the league, have fun and produce positive and productive young men," the coach added. "This is a good group of people doing what they love and it shows."

With such a young team, Hamilton knows experience is needed to compete in the SBAAC and that's something he hopes to build throughout the season.

But if health is good, Hamilton said the team can battle the top teams in the National Division if "each player continues to buy-in to our new culture and

philosophy."

The Clinton-Massie squad finished 5-10-2 last season, third in the SBAAC American Division under Tom Henderson in his first season as head coach.

been regulars this summer at our open courts,” Sexton said. “I expect both of them to be leaders of this team. Also, Lydia and Breanna as seniors will be leaders.

“I really like this group of kids. I don’t know if we’ll be deep enough to win a league title this year, but I

## CLINTON-MASSIE

Julie Kirby will be entering her fifth season as the Clinton-Massie girls tennis coach and the program will be seeking SBAAC American Division championship No. 3 in that span.

The Falcons were runaway winners in the American last season and finished with a 20-1 record.

Addison Swope, a two-time first team all-league player, was the American Division player of the year for the Falcons while Kirby was named the coach of the year.

Maria Jones was a perfect 10-0 at second singles for the Falcons

in league play and won the tournament bracket. Elle Dunham and Noel Gasaway were 10-0 at second doubles. Mikayla Wonderly and Brylie Green also were all first team All-SBAAC. For Green and Gasaway it was a second first team honor.

Wonderly and Dunham graduated from CMHS in the spring.

Gasaway, Jones, Swope, Dakota Cartner, Green, and Lilly Logsdon are seniors on the Massie roster this season.

Kirby said Cartner leads a strong group of junior varsity players from 2023 who will move on up this season. “Dakota ... is such a coachable athlete,” Kirby said. “I think we are going to be seeing her on the varsity court a lot more this year. We lost two varsity seniors (from 2023) and all the JV players have been

working this summer to be able to fill the spots. I am very pleased to see that it will be a tough decision to see who will be in the line up.”

Juniors on the team include Ellie Smith, Paige Oberweiser, Alyssa Lorenz and Jenny Anderson.

Kirby said the “sensational six” seniors lead this team in a variety of ways, whether it be keeping “coach on track,” helping younger players, team spirit and attitude, focus or player improvement.

“They all bring their best game and truly want to win,” said Kirby. The team will sit atop the league again if it remains “focused and remembers the team comes first. The girls have had an amazing run the past two years for themselves and the school and I think they
